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New Student Experience

Baylor cares about your transition into college, so all incoming students are required to take a New Student Experience (NSE) course. NSE courses provide the opportunity for first-semester students to form meaningful connections with each other and with faculty in an academic community. NSE courses also introduce students to the key values of a liberal education including critical thinking, the integration of faith and learning, and social responsibility. NSE courses are designed to support your success by engaging you academically, socially, and spiritually in the earliest stages of student development.

By the end of the first year, through your participation in the overall New Student Experience programming at Baylor including Orientation, Line Camp, Move-In, Welcome Week, Chapel, and this NSE course, we hope you will: Understand Baylor's mission and learning outcomes, connect to Baylor, engage in spiritual formation, develop personal and professional goals, succeed academically, and develop autonomy through caring community.

Course Overview

Exploring Vocation and Calling would be a course aimed at preparing students for success in their academic journey through the framework of examining the nature of vocation and calling. Students will be introduced to reading assignments that will challenge and encourage their understanding of what it means to be a faithful student presently, and what it will mean as a person of faith in the workplace. The students will engage in a group presentation for each reading with the intention to deepening peer to peer relationships and fostering a good personal work ethic in a group setting. In addition, students will utilize an assessment tool to assist in clarifying future goals in their major field and following career path. The integration of a more developed understanding of God's role and desire for the student will give perspective to the assessment results. Finally, students will be asked to reflect on their initial understanding of God's calling for their lives (or in general) and will write another analysis at the conclusion of study in order to measure the impact of readings and exercises. In doing so, the students will articulate their personal responsibilities in light of the work that God is doing in them and through them.

Materials/Text

No textbook is required for this course, but pen and paper are useful materials to bring to class. You are expected to arrive on time to EVERY session with a willingness to participate in class discussion. While readings will be presented by a specific group, each student is expected to read by every article. The following readings can be found on Canvas:

Assignments:

Write a one-page (double—spaced, Times New Roman, size 12 font) reflection on your understanding of God's call either in general or specifically how you understand God's calling in your life. Submit assignment via Canvas. Document should be in Microsoft Word Format.

- **3. Strong Interest Inventory**[®] Due September 2nd (10 points)
- One-on-one Appointment- Due the week of September 24th September 28th (10 points)
 Attend one-on-one appointment with instructor to discuss your career path, vocation and calling. One-on-one sessions will be held during the week of September 26th.

4. Group Presentation on Weekly Article (25 points)

Groups and corresponding articles will be assigned in class and graded upon these criteria:

- 1. Cover content in assigned article (10 pts)
- 2. Creativity of presentation (10 pts)
- 3. Group collaboration (5 pts)

7. Final Reflection Paper- Due November 16th (20 points)

Review your first reflection paper and then write a two-page paper (double—spaced, Times New Roman, size 12 font) in response to it and how your understanding of the call of God has shifted or been informed through you study this fall. Submit assignment via Canvas. Document should be in Microsoft Word Format.

8. Class discussion and participation (10 points)

Students are expected to read all assignments and participate in the class conversations. Cell-phones and tablets are to remain out of sight. Use of cell-phones will result in a first warning, and then for every following instance, the student will be counted absent. Points are awarded for attendance, participation in class conversation, and interaction with the material.
